Built in 1911, the Jacobean Architectural Style vault building exhibits a collection of intricate masonry techniques. The segmented arch spans over a highly detailed wood batten door and the layering of brick detail is quite extraordinary for a small rural setting at the turn of the century.

The fine detailing continues through to the face of the parapet walls with carved stone coping and a nicely executed circular recess as the focus of the Jacobean inspired parapet lines. The eave lines with a stepped and blocked corbelling also exhibit the level of hand work and craftsmanship rarely executed in modern buildings.

Historic Vault Building



In 1909, ash trees were planted around the grounds and an iron fence was purchased and placed to enclose the cemetery. Additional acreage was purchased in 1918 for the east addition with a decorative gate anchoring the southeast corner.
